SWEBOK proposes three common themes (Quality, Tools Measurement) which run through the 10 software engineering Knowledge Areas (KAs).

Two of these themes (Quality and Tools) made the cut as distinct KAs, but Measurement missed out. See **Last Words** by Ted Smilie for research findings supporting the argument that Software Measurement is a KA.
